“Big Man Fritsche” Scholarship

Leonard Fritsche was a long-time resident of Glendale and La Crescenta where he worked. Mr. Fritsche was a man before his time in his views of the world around him. As a small business owner, he worked hard, lived modestly, and enjoyed helping others to expand their horizons and to improve their lives. He was known by many as “The Big Man.” He also had a special place in his heart for youth and the importance of a good educational start for a successful path later in life. In keeping with The Big Man’s love of thinking outside the box, this award is for a student pursuing a vocational study (career technical path with examples that include woodworking, auto mechanics, plumbing, landscaping, dental hygienist, vet tech, electrical, cosmetology, culinary arts, etc.) toward achieving whatever dream may be in their future. A recipient of this scholarship must reside in and graduate from a public/private high school in the Verdugo Region (Burbank, Glendale, foothill communities of Sunland, Tujunga, La Crescenta, La Canada-Flintridge, Montrose, and Verdugo City). The student must be pursuing a certificate or degree from a non-profit, accredited institution in a career technical field (two or three-year program). This award is not for a student enrolling in a four-year college or university. Financial need will be considered. The student should show an entrepreneurial aptitude, a potential for achievement and evidence of self-motivation. Qualified students may be selected for an in person interview.

Christopher A. Burrows Memorial Scholarship

The Burrows Memorial Scholarship was established in memory of Christopher A. Burrows, a 1976 graduate of Crescenta Valley High School and La Canada resident, who passed away in 1999 from a malignant brain tumor. Mr. Burrows was an attorney, an active community volunteer, a loving husband, and father of four, and a devoted friend who encouraged young and old alike. This scholarship is awarded to students who reside in La Canada Flintridge or La Crescenta and are graduating from a public or private high school in La Canada Flintridge or La Crescenta. The student must demonstrate a high level of academic and extra-curricular achievement, strength of character, and a zest for life.

Mrs. Dellinger was a teacher in the Burbank Unified School District (BUSD) for 36 years and Mr. Dellinger worked for the City of Burbank Community Development Department for 12 years. This scholarship aims to support hardworking BUSD graduates who value education, demonstrate a high level of academic achievement, engage in community service and emulate the Dellingers' generous spirit. One of the greatest lessons the Dellingers taught their students is the idea of "paying it forward." Following their example, scholarship recipients should be willing to support the Dellinger Scholarship in the future, when able, in whatever way they can (for example, helping with fundraising, marketing, reviewing applications, etc.).

Caroline Mae Benjamin graduated from Glendale High School in 1929. Mrs. Benjamin received her nursing degree from Bishop Johnson College of Nursing in Los Angeles. Mrs. Benjamin established this scholarship in 2000 in memory of her husband. The fund provides scholarships each year to graduating Glendale Unified School District students studying for a medical career.

Emilie Cacho Memorial Scholarship

The Emilie Cacho Memorial Scholarship Fund will be awarded to Latina students from Hoover High School who are interested in pursuing a career in mental health, school counseling, psychology or social work at either a two-year or four-year college or university. Emilie was born on June 28, 1934 in Pala, California to Herminia and Antonio Cacho, immigrants from Michoacán, Mexico and itinerant agricultural laborers who would eventually create a successful family farm business in Southern California. Emilie was one of the first Latinas to attend the University of California at Los Angeles. She graduated in 1957 with a degree in Spanish and Latin American Studies. After raising her children, Emilie went on to complete a Master's Degree in Marriage and Family Counseling at Azusa Pacific College. Emilie was often the only Spanish-speaking mental health provider on-site and the first therapist many of her clients had ever received support from. She worked as a therapist and clinical supervisor at a wide range of mental health centers and public schools, and also established a successful private practice. Her therapeutic approach to serving Latino and other bi-cultural clients was featured in Ms. Magazine and La Opinion.

Applicants must profess a belief that Jesus Christ is the Son of God and their personal Savior. The student must be a graduating senior, have a minimum overall 2.5 GPA, and must be a U.S. Citizen. Student must show proof of a minimum of 13 years residency in the Glendale, La Crescenta, La Cañada Flintridge, Montrose, Verdugo City, Sunland or Tujunga area, even if attending other area private or public high schools. This award may be considered for a renewal for up to 3 additional years.

Cindy had a stellar academic standing, majored in journalism, and was honored to be Editor of the *El Rodeo*, USC's annual year book. Years later, family friend, David Bieringer, who also attended Glendale High with academic honors and had achieved the rank of Eagle Scout, was involved in an auto accident and passed away. He was a junior at Cal State Los Angeles at the time. Frank and Ann were deeply inspired to create a scholarship honoring students whose academic achievements mirrored those of Cindy and David. This scholarship recognizes a deserving Glendale High School senior who has strived to do his or her academic best.

If qualified, the student will be considered for a personal interview.

Gonzales-Harris Bilingual Scholarship

Helping others seemed to come naturally for the Gonzales sisters. Margaret, Evelyn, and Virginia were born to Ralph and Marie Gonzales, who originally hailed from Wilcox, Arizona. Upon relocating to Glendale they continued to nurture strong work ethics, education, and the idea of giving back to others. These benevolent sisters left assets in their estate to create scholarships so students would

have a chance to improve their lives and someday give back to their own communities. Students must be graduating from a public or private high school in Burbank, Glendale, and the foothill communities of Sunland, Tujunga, La Crescenta, La Cañada Flintridge, Montrose, and Verdugo City (Verdugo Region), have a minimum overall 3.5 GPA, provide proof of U.S. Citizenship and be able to demonstrate fluency in both Spanish and English. If qualified, the student may be considered for a personal interview where the student's Spanish fluency will be assessed. This scholarship may be considered for a renewal during the student's first undergraduate degree.

John & Elsie Krikorian / Women Achievers Journalism Scholarship

John and Elsie Krikorian were the founders and editors of *Business Life Magazine* which has provided the Burbank, Glendale, Pasadena and Foothill communities and surrounding areas with local business and economic news for over 25 years. The Krikorians were focused on identifying diversity within the business community and providing ways in which stellar business professionals could be identified and recognized. Their signature Women Achievers Event, launched in 1990, was a pioneering idea for women professionals and has now grown to welcome an annual sell-out crowd with business and mentoring workshops and awards celebrating top women achievers. John's passing in 2013 and Elsie's passing in 2015 inspired *Business Life Magazine* and the community to create a scholarship that would recognize a deserving female student pursuing a career in journalism, marketing, or business management.

Sambar Scholarship Endowment

His wife, Lois Neil-Sambar, was also a teacher in the GUSD and a principal at Rosemont Middle School. Together, they administered the Glendale Scholarship Endowment, now known as the Sambar Scholarship Endowment, which provides scholarships to public or private high school graduates within the GUSD boundaries pursuing a higher education. **Financial need is a primary determining factor for this scholarship. A FAFSA/SAR report is required to be considered for this scholarship.**

The Tuesday Afternoon Club (TAC) began over 100 years ago with 8 Glendale women who played bridge every Tuesday. The TAC women founded the Glendale Library in 1907 which housed approximately 100 books in a rented poolroom. Upon the dissolution of the Club in 1999, the Board

members chose to place remaining assets in a fund with the Community Foundation. The collaboration between the Club and the Foundation has enjoyed a long history and in addition, has provided scholarships to graduating Glendale Unified School District students. **Financial need must be demonstrated (a FAFSA/SAR report is required to be considered for this scholarship)**, along with proof of U.S. Citizenship and community service. The student should be able to show a potential for achievement, success, and self-motivation.
